From the time of Manifest Destiny to the age of global warming art has had a powerful impact on environmental reform. Paintings, photographs, and the environmental-themed coffee-table book were all instrumental in the creation of America's national parks and in the passage of The Wilderness Act (1964), legislation that would guarantee the permanence of the nation's wilderness preserves. Recently, the success of Al Gore's book and film, *An Inconvenient Truth* — and the film's capacity to alert and inform a diverse population to the problem of global warming — is a prime example of the way in which art can be used in aid of the environment. Today artists are working with scientists, marine biologists, botanists, urban planners and industrial engineers to discover creative solutions to ecological problems.

And for all this, nature is never spent is an exhibition of contemporary artists working in a variety of traditional and nontraditional media, who employ their talents in the service of increasing environmental awareness, providing a variety of approaches and models of participatory engagement, designing solutions to environmental problems and broadening public concern for what is becoming the most pressing issue of our time – degradation of the environment. **The participating artists are: Subhankar Banerjee, Sue Coe, Mark Jones, Samm Kunce, Stephanie Lempert, Jesse Potts, Christy Rupp, Chris Sollars, Alan Sonfist, and Susan Unterberg.** The exhibition, organized by Jo Anna Isaak and Fordham University students, is hosted by Pelham Art Center and will be on view March 13 - April 25, 2009. There is no fee to visit the exhibit.

In celebration of Earth Day, Fordham University students involved in the exhibition *And for all this, nature is never spent*, lead tours of the exhibit and invite the public to participate in art-making activities.

Jo Anna Isaak is the Marion Chair in Art History at Fordham University. Her research and writing focus on modern and contemporary art and critical theory and more recently on environmental issues. Her first book traced the connections between visual art and literature in European modernism; her second book was an exploration of laughter as a revolutionary strategy employed by contemporary women artists. She has organized several art exhibitions that have toured the U.S. and Canada including: "The Revolutionary Power of Women's Laughter," "Looking Forward, Looking Black" and "H2O," an exhibition about water and the human body. She has been the recipient of several awards including The J. Paul Getty Fellowship and the Hewlett Mellon Fellowship for Research in the Soviet Union.

Robert Emmet Hernan is Senior Counsel for Commissioner Initiatives at the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation where he is responsible for identifying environmental problems not being addressed by the Department, identifying and developing resources to address these problems, and implementing enforcement and other actions to correct the problems, including Stop Smoking Trucks enforcement campaign in communities disproportionately impacted by pollution. Prior to this, Mr. Hernan worked as an Assistant Attorney General in the Environmental Protection Bureau, where he served as a trial counsel in the Love Canal litigation. He is the author of many articles, and most recently, *Vulnerable On This Earth: Environmental Disasters of the Twentieth Century*, a book telling the stories of 16 environmental disasters throughout the world, illustrated by photographs of the events, under consideration by several publishers.
